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Low Water Adventure

San Miguel River

This spring, Mike and I were invited to join Lee Bartlett and Rod and Judy Martin for a day trip on the San Miguel River. At 175 miles from Silt, it stretches the limit of a day trip for us, and water levels were looking low. Nevertheless, we were energized by the prospect of a sunny, warm day, a gorgeous scenic drive, and a chance to paddle with the folks from Montrose.

The road trip met our expectations. From Whitewater, we headed west, descending into the narrow green pastureland of Unaweep Canyon. At Gateway, we emerged into vertical red rock country with a view of the snowy La Sal mountains in the background. We continued upstream along the Dolores River and then the San Miguel, meeting our group at the power station just east of Naturita. After discussing our options, we decided to play on the "Ledges" run. From the power station, we drove upstream to the "green truss bridge", our takeout. Then we turned right on a small, muddy dirt road that winds through the wooded riparian zone, and headed upstream about 5 miles. Our put-in was a primitive campsite along the

river, not marked in any way. Apparently it is not critical to launch from a specific site. The guys ran a quick shuttle, and we were ready to paddle.

The riverbed there is composed of blocky chunks and slabs of sedimentary rock, making for a busy Class II run that is full of play spots. The flow was low, probably not more than 400 cfs. That level is certainly navigable, if you don't mind whacking your paddle on the rocky bottom at times.

On the Ledges run, you can take your pick from a multitude of surf holes ranging from smooth, river-wide waves to steeper side-surf ledges. Rod and Judy, paddling tandem in their Mad River Synergy, demonstrated masterful surfing ability. Lee challenged himself in some of the bigger, gnarlier holes. I momentarily forgot my side-surfing skills and became the only swimmer for the day.

This run can be part of a longer day trip or a multi-day trip. The section we ran did not have any rapids that required scouting from shore, but that may not be true for the longer run.

The San Miguel has a short boating season, especially during a year of low snowpack, such as now. If you find yourself in the vicinity of Telluride or the Dolores river basin during the runoff, it's well worth exploring.

North Fork of the Cache La Poudre

(Lower Section)

I had the opportunity to run this creek twice this year. My first run down was with Susan Graham and Eric Bernhardt at 350-cfs and the second run included Susan Graham, Doug Green, Jeff Evans and Ken Bauer at 265-cfs. At 350-cfs, the water is swift moving, but not pushy. The 265-cfs run still had plenty of water, but not quite as exciting.

This stretch is about 11-miles long or so with typically a very short season. The run consists of 8 miles of creeky class II+ with a few III- drops; 1 ½ mile paddle across Seamans reservoir; a 70 yard portage; and 1 mile or so of class II water to the take out.

The scenery on this trip is outstanding! You think your paddling in a western movie. This run has both a ranchland and wilderness feel. On one trip we saw a rattle snake on the bank and a few cows. The second trip we saw a Golden Eagle and a few cows.

The creek is very windy and tight in spots. Your first time down your not sure what lurks around every corner, as it is hard to see due to the bushes along the banks and tight turns. There were also enough rapids to keep it interesting and there were quit a few surf waves. The paddle across Seamans took 75 minutes the first time and 45 minutes or so the second time.

There are four fences that cross the river. All of the fences were easy spotted. We floated over three of the fences and one required a portage. However, Susan was able to slip her boat through the portage fence on the right side.

We never saw another boater on either trip. We did see a few people around the Larimer County open space and around the reservoir on the first run.

The put in is West of Livermore on 74E Rd at the Bridge. We took out both times at the old Filter Plant put in. If you wanted you could run Filter Plant also, but we found our selves pretty tired by the time we reached the take out.

This run makes for a long day, especially if you get wind on the reservoir, but I felt it was well worth it as I did it twice this season.

If it runs next year and you like a scenic paddle with mild rapids, check it out.

dent in getting the right to have 1,000 cfs flow through Clear Creek for recreational purposes. This is the first time that recreational uses have been given any right to the water. The downstream users fought the case arguing that Golden couldn't change the water rights that have been in existence for over a century just because there may be a race or other competition. This signifies a major shift in power from the agricultural to the money that boaters spend and the economic impact that the cities receive from hosting competitions.

Paddling the "Filter Plant" Run on the Poudre

Lower Picnic Rock — Friends of the Poudre (FOP), Poudre Paddlers, and other organizations have teamed up with the City of Fort Collins to reopen Lower Picnic Rock. Lower Picnic Rock is a picnic ground and parking lot that has served as the take-out for the Filter Plant run on the Cache la Poudre River. While arrangements to maintain the site are not totally set yet, here's what's happening.

A sign will be installed notifying the public that the area is being maintained by volunteer labor by Poudre Paddlers, FOP, and other organizations and requesting everyone to haul out their own trash. No visible trash canisters or pickup will be evident. This is a usermaintained area. Paddlers who are paddling Filter Plant are urged to take 5 or 10 minutes when taking-out to pick up litter at Lower Picnic Rock.

FOP, Poudre Paddlers, etc., will also be making arrangements for sewage disposal. We do not yet know whether the existing outhouse will be reopened or if a porta-john system will replace it. The exact distribution of labor and expense between these groups and the City has yet to be determined.

Gateway Park — The City of Fort Collins has opened its first mountain park. It is located a bit upstream of the longstanding Filter Plant put-in. For those of you who have wondered where the name "Filter Plant" came from, this is it. To this day, there is a functioning primary water treatment facility at this location. You can see the domed structure from Hwy.14 as you climb a hill. There is an historic secondary water treatment facility on the premises too, and the North Fork of the Poudre spills out into the main stem in Gateway Park. It is now an alternate put-in and place to picnic. Here's the scoop.

Initially, the Park was opened with a day pass (\$4 ? per car) required. Through the work of Poudre Paddlers (for one), you can now buy an annual pass for \$30. Paul Berkholder, the onsite, resident manager for Gateway will sell you an annual pass.

The City wants to improve safety for both boaters and people driving on Hwy.14. So, if we are speedy about unloading our boats and gear and park outside the park, we can use this put-in for free. The idea is to take only 5 minutes unloading boats and gear on weekends or holidays. Then move your car to the pullout just west of the entrance to Gateway Park from Hwy.14. It's on the north side of the highway. Then walk back down into the park. If launching on a weekday, you can take 10-15 minutes to unload. If you are taking advantage of this nofee way of using the Gateway put-in, you will need to consolidate boats, etc. onto as few vehicles as possible before entering the park. Parking space is extremely limited in Gateway Park. Bring the family sometime and combine a paddle with a picnic. Come to fish.

Or hike across the bridge that crosses the river and hike up to Seaman Reservoir. Gateway Park also now serves as one way to get back into DOW land by foot. (The public cannot use this bridge to drive up there. The bridge simply isn't engineered for high levels of auto use.)

So, (thanks to our friends up north, ed.) there are lots of new goings on up the Poudre Canyon this year. If you want to check out the extra section of Filter Plant, try Gateway out as a put-in.

PREREQUISITES: Participation in the course (or an equivalent) that you want to be certified in. Participation in a river safety class is highly recommended. You must be in good physical shape.

EQUIPMENT: Must provide your own equipment. An equipment list will be provided.

INSTRUCTORS: Jeff Oxenford (lead instructor/ IT candidate), Bob Foote (assistant/evaluator)

LOCATION: Colorado - First three days will be at Bear Creek Park, Morrison, CO. Moving water and whitewater will be on Clear Creek in Golden. Evening classes will be held in Golden, CO. Locations are subject to change based on water levels.

REGISTRATION AND INFORMATION: Class size is limited to 10 and space is available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Full-payment (non-refundable) is required to register for the class.
